Review questions by scope area	<p>Review question 4:</p> <p>What is the effectiveness of <u>support models and frameworks</u> to improve transition from children's to adults' services?</p> <p>Review question 5:</p> <p>What is the effectiveness of <u>interventions</u> designed to improve transition from children's to adults' services?</p> <p>Review question 7:</p> <p>How can the transition process (including preparing the young person, making the transfer and supporting them after the move) be managed effectively <u>for those receiving a combination of different services?</u></p> <p>Review question 9:</p> <p>How can <u>adults' services</u> support effective transitions for young people?</p>
Population	Care leavers with established familial relationships with their foster carers. Excludes individuals with placement instability, those placed with parents, secure units, children's homes and hostels.
Interventions and comparators considered for inclusion	<p>Intervention A: 'Staying Put 18+' programme (Munro et al. 2012) that allows care leavers the option to stay with their foster carers up until age 21.</p> <p>Comparator A: Standard care leaver services.</p>
Perspective	NHS and personal social services.
Outcomes	QALYs, education, employment.
Type of analysis	None undertaken due to data limitations.
Issues to note	The analysis could not be completed due to the limitations in study design and could not be used reliably for an economic analysis. Therefore, no economic modelling was continued on this study (Munro et al. 2012).
